"Shakespeare in the city walk"

Shakespeare in the city walk is a leisurely walking tour to uncover lesser-known monuments and locations in the city of London with connections to Shakespeare's life, his friends, his loves and his work.

The Charles Dickens Museum is a typical Georgian terraced house which was Charles Dickens' home from 25 March 1837 (a year after his marriage) to December 1839.

The London Dungeon features 18 shows, 20 actors and 3 rides. Visitors are taken on a journey through 1000 years of London's history where they meet actors performing as some of London's most infamous characters, including Jack the Ripper and Sweeney Todd.
